

Instructions for Authors

Publication type: *FULL PAPER (RESEARCH ARTICLES, POSITION PAPERS, CONSENSUS STATEMENTS)*

Title

The title should be in bold, sentence case with no full stop at the end.

Example:

Results from experiments in this field

Non-standard abbreviations should not be used in the title.

Authors

Author names should be in regular font, as first name (middle initials if applicable) and surname without full stop at the end. Author names should be separated by a comma, using 'and' before the last name in the author list. Where authors are from a number of different institutions, the appropriate institution number from the affiliation list should be given as a superscript number immediately after each author's name. The corresponding author should be indicated by an asterisk.

Example:

Maria Müller¹, Peter Mayr², Bill M. Fisher³ and John C. Walker^{4,*}

Please consult with your co-authors to make sure that name spelling is correct and consistent when one person is (co)author on several abstracts. Journal preference is spelling of names in the authors' language, i.e. including original diacritical marks (umlauts, accents, hooks etc.).

If a paper is prepared on behalf of a scientific or other organisation, this must be declared in a brief statement following the items listed above.

Affiliations

Affiliations should include department, institute, town and country. Where there are multiple affiliations, these should appear in the order used against the author names (see above paragraph) and show the appropriate superscript number.

Affiliations should be followed by the corresponding author's e-mail address.

Example:

Abstract

An abstract should be supplied which should summarise the intention, main findings and conclusions of the study. Speculations should not be included in the abstract (nor should they be part of the concluding paragraph of the main text); however, they may be discussed in the Discussion section of the article.

Manuscripts written in a language other than English also require the preparation of an English title and abstract, which will be published together with the article. Alternatively, by agreement with the authors or copyright owners, the editorial board may compile an English abstract from the summarising section(s) of the article; such editorial abstracts will be published as supplementary material to the publication and will be available through the article's web address (and will therefore be accessible from the same DOI).

Main body of text

Research papers should be clearly divided into Abstract, Introduction, Methods, Results, Discussion, Acknowledgements, and References.

Further subdivisions or deviations from this general structure (e.g. for position papers) are permissible if appropriate for the topic covered.

Please use double line spacing. Type the text unjustified, *without* hyphenating words at line breaks. Use hard returns only to end headings and paragraphs, not to rearrange lines.

Greek and other special characters may be included. If you are unable to reproduce a particular special character, please type out the name of the symbol in full and specify the character to be included in a separate, accompanying message.

SI units should be used throughout (litre and molar are permitted, however).

Make sure that receptors and ion channels are named following the recommendations of the nomenclature committees of IUPHAR and BPS (see <http://www.guidetopharmacology.org>).

Abbreviations and acronyms should be used as sparingly as possible. They should be defined when first used in the text.

Speculations about the potential significance of the data presented for future research or medical treatment of patients should not be included in the Abstract or in the concluding paragraph of the main text section; however, they might be included in the Discussion section, provided that it is made clear that

Figures

Figures must be electronically as separate files in TIF, JPG or GIF format. Care must be taken that resolution is high enough for processing (typically a minimum of 300 dpi with dimensions enlarged to A5 or A4 size). Labeling of axes or any other parts of the figure must be in a font size enough for being easily readable when reduced to one-column (or for large figures two-column) size.

For each figure a figure legend must be supplied that includes a figure heading and an explanatory text that describes all parts of the figure in a manner that readers may understand the figure without having to refer to the main text. The text of the figure legends should be included in the manuscript as a separate section (and not as part of the figure graphic file).

Tables

The number of tables should be kept to the minimum necessary to illustrate the findings of the study. Bear in mind that complicated tables are difficult for readers to understand and therefore pay attention to use a table layout that is as clear and self-explanatory as possible.

For each table a table heading has to be supplied. Symbols in the table have to be explained in a table legend, which should be given as a separate section of the manuscript.

Grant support or funding

All sources of funding, whether academic (e.g. grant support) or non-academic must be stated in a separate Acknowledgements section. In case of grants or funding from non-academic/industrial sources, the nature of the support must be explained.

References

Please include references *only if* you feel that they are absolutely necessary. The number of references should be kept as small as possible.

All references should be cited/called out consecutively in the text, using numbers in square brackets, e.g. '[1]'. Only papers that have

been published, or are in press, or are available through public e-print / preprint servers should be included in the reference list.

Unpublished observations or personal communications may not be included in the list of references, but may, if unavoidable, be mentioned in the text, provided that these are clearly marked as such.

Journal abbreviations should follow MEDLINE standards. For each reference, name *all* authors. Page numbers should be given in full (e.g. 1234–1239, *not* 1234–9). If possible, the DOI (digital object identifier) of the journal article should be supplied.

If web addresses (URLs) are given as the resource of a citation, these should be provided in full and *without* adding any soft hyphens, spaces or line breaks. The (last) accession date must be given in parentheses following the URL citation.

References should be laid out at the end of the abstract and preceded by the relevant reference number.

Conflict of interest declaration

Declarations on potential conflicts of interest should be provided for all authors of the article. This should typically include all financial or personal relationships with industry, government agencies or public health system authorities or the like for recent years (e.g. for the last 5 years). Conflict of interest declarations do not mean that authors are in fact conflicted, but should allow the reader to judge on their own the types of relationship of authors with non-academic parties, such as companies, government or public health system authorities.

Manuscript submission

All manuscripts and supporting materials have to be submitted exclusively in electronic form. Submissions on paper cannot be accepted. Submissions have to be sent to the Editor of the journal (editor@intrinsicactivity.org).
